

REGION STRATEGY REPORT

Groups looking at growth

Over the past few months, we have been discussing growth strategies for our Region to spread the Scouting word and offer everything Scouting has to more kids.

As we start planning for Term 4, it is time to ensure we have dedicated recruitment opportunities in our program. From our Recruitment Strategy Day in July, we looked at our target of 2,020 Youth members by the end of this year. This is 5% growth from where we are today.

Here is my thinking regarding recruitment opportunities;

It needs to be early in Term 4.

It needs to be well planned.

The program needs to be interesting (as it should be anyway) to ensure they stay.

We can't forget that retaining our members is equally important in meeting this target. For every member we lose, we need to recruit that one in addition to our two new members.

I would love to hear some great stories of successful recruiting between now and the end of the year. As always, please give me a shout if there is anything we can do to help.

GWS goes to the Rugby League

On Friday 1st September, 140 Scouts headed off to ANZ Stadium to watch the Parramatta Eels play the final round for the 2017 season.

Kicking off at 5.15pm, the team engaged many of the 21,533 crowd and worked to raise awareness and profile of Scouting in the community, handing out brochures, Scout Balloons, Tattoos. In addition, Westmead Venturers ran a stall to promote their Mt Everest trek and take donations.

The outcome is that the community had the opportunity to find out more about Scouting and support recruitment of new members, leaders and parent helpers.


Through visibility and discussion with adult attendees we had a number of enquiries that we could direct to the Scout website and contact numbers.

A few issues from the applications that need to be addressed:

- Late applications if you can't get to the office, post the forms in and arrange payment later.
- Applications missing membership numbers and other details.
- Parents not adding important information such as special needs and dietary requirements and waiting until
 they deliver their child to the course to tell me everything that should have been discussed over the phone in
 advance. Very difficult to deal with while 66 other cubs are also coming in and need organising! It also means
 that someone has to go and buy special food which could have been organised much earlier.
- Leaders not taking the responsibility for ensuring the correctly completed form and money is sent to Region Office (it is not the parent's responsibility many don't even know where the office is).
- Poorly scanned forms, making the information difficult to read snail mail would be better!

Parramatta Ramble was held on **Sunday 17th September** with 19 Packs participating. The response could have been better, but I'm glad to say that the feedback I have had so far, has been very positive. Thank you to all those who did the Ramble on such a perfect spring day.

Our next Region event will be *Cub Baanya* on *October 28 and 29*. This camp is focused on skills for the older Cub Scout, who work in Patrols with a PL and APL. I know there is a Region Scout Leadership Course and a region Hike on as well, but I am hoping that each District can get two Scouts to spend the weekend camping at Bundilla. All the information has been distributed via your Seeonees and is on the website. **Registration closes on October 16.**

George Saville CSL / LIC 1st Mt Druitt Scout Group 12th March 1956 - 7th September 2017

George Saville, Akela from 1st Mt Druitt Scout Group, was a man of few words; a big man with a big heart and a dedicated Leader who could be seen at almost every Blacktown District event over many years.

We could list his awards and years of service in Scouting, but that's not what George was all about. He was humble in all he did and what he achieved; he took it all in his stride. As George would say, "It's what a leader does"! George's Scouting family would all agree that George will be best remembered for how he lived and breathed the essence of Scouting to 'DO YOUR BEST'.

He guided many Cubs Scouts through his leadership and passion for the Scouting movement during his 29 years of Service as ACSL, through to CSL and Leader in Charge. If any one ever needed help, George would always put his hand up to assist. He was also great with thinking outside the square and finding solutions to ensure his cubs could always participate, even if they were unable to pay their way! If he could boost a Cub Pack's size, he would bring his cubs over, to not only mingle with other cub packs from the district but to genuinely help out in running the night or activities.

George never complained and just got on with whatever needed to be done. He always supported his fellow leaders and District and Region activities by working on the many and varied activities on offer to Cub Scouts, including:

Blacktown District Billy Cart Derby (now in its 25th year), Blacktown District Cub camps, Blacktown Festival District JOTA/JOTI, Cuboree shakedown camps and 5 NSW State Cuborees, District Campfires Cub Scout Leadership courses, Region Cub Fun days, Leader's Retreat Training days and Inter-pack activities science nights/family fish inn.

George, you left us so suddenly! We of Blacktown District thank you for all you gave of yourself to Scouting.

Now you have been called home - know that YOU DID YOUR BEST.

BSL Course - Penrith City District

In Scouting, we learn by doing – and we have fun doing it! We develop life skills, encourage teamwork, inspire motivation, install confidence and build leadership. It's this last thing, Leadership, I'd like to touch on briefly.

After a couple of stalled attempts at running a BSL (Basic Scout Leadership) course, we finally got one off the ground for the weekend of Sat 19th and 20th August, held it at 1st Springwood Scout hall in the beautiful Blue Mountains.

A BSL is a requirement for any Scout looking to obtain the ASM (Australian Scout Medallion) – the pinnacle award within the Scout youth section, but, it doesn't have to be ONLY for those looking to attain this achievement.

We all have a need for leadership skills within our troop lines. Patrol Leaders, Assistant Patrol Leaders, Troop Leaders (for those groups/troops who use the role), anyone potentially aspiring to fill those assigned roles or those we see as potentials to do so in the future. In addition to those named roles — we need others to have leadership skills to be the 'informal' leaders who have the ability to engage and motivate others. We all know people through our lives like this. Those who might not have a "manager/boss/leader" title, but they're the ones who can help you get things done - because when they start doing something, others have a natural tendency to follow.

We knew there was an upcoming region BSL course (https://www.events.greaterwestscouts.com.au/event/76 - Oct 27th & 29th) but were aware of their maximum 28 person limit and that we could easily fill at least half of it from our district.... If they were all fortunate enough to get in!

From an organisational perspective all of the section leaders from different troops in the district were assigned various subjects/sessions to run (or co-run with others), all using the objectives from the 'BSL Course – Scout Leaders working pack', with our own version of ice-breaker games and activities. The two days were full of fun and challenging sessions – a few videos on various topics like the patrol system and bullying with a few fillers on PLAN-DO-REVIEW. Visit http://www.patroltent.com/tools-and-resources/scout-leadership-course/ for a suggested plan/outline and the video content.

Of course the adult leaders prepared all meals during the weekend so the Scouts' focus was on their tasks at hand and on Saturday night, we polished our 'butler skills' and served them dinner complete with our beautiful gravy boat (plastic jug) served at the table!


Every single one of the 16 participants gave feedback that they had a great time and learnt something. As an adult leader, I can honestly say that the best part of the weekend was those moments when you can see a young boy or girls face light up, their head tilt a little and the glint form in their eye to indicate that they finally "get it" - that their troop will only give back to them what they put into it. If they go into Scouting with the attitude of "it will be boring" and not get involved, then it will become a self-fulfilling prophesy and it WILL be boring. If they demonstrate LEADERSHIP then they can inject the fun, excitement and learning (with badge work by stealth!) they so desperately crave.

I'd like to thank Fiona Sherwin (Tinonee) for her outstanding leadership in driving this course from the seed of an idea through to fruition. In addition, those adult leaders who gave their time, experience and own leadership to ensure the course ran.. maybe not without a hitch... but exceptionally well. We modified our PLAN a little as we went on, but the REVIEW shows that we had a great end-result.

For those groups/troops who have not participated before – consider enrolling in the Region BSL course or perhaps discussing the idea of running a course in your district at your Mindari.



When we finish with the Cubs on Sunday we are travelling to **1st Thirroul Scouts** to do a workshop with the Scout Troop.

There are several Group workshops planned for the rest of the year with **1st Greystanes and 1st Turramurra** lodging expressions of interest.

Unfortunately we will not be able to take any more travelling bookings for September – November as many of our performers and trainers are sitting the HSC and the rest of us are putting our feet up for a bit of a break!

Cirque du Scout meets September 26, October 10, October 24, November 7, November 21, December 5. Check with us before turning up, as we might be hosting another group or out and about! 
