PETER ANDREW WAITE OAM

Saturday 2nd July 2022, aged 90

In 1960, Peter became the Scout Leader at 2nd Pennant Hills and in 1964-68 was District Scout Leader with Pennant Hills District. From 1968 to 1974 he was the Assistant Area Commissioner with Cumberland Area. This was followed by a further four years with 2nd Pennant Hills Scouts before he resumed as AAC Cumberland until 1983. Peter was in the cast and worked on the Set Construction team of Cumberland Gang Show from 1975 to 1977.

Peter held Cumberland Area Warden, Activities and Branch Special Project ranks from 1983 to 1988. He was District Commissioner, Pennant Hills District from 1988 to 1993 and Assistant Area Commissioner, North Metropolitan Area to 1996. From 1996 Peter was an Honorary Commissioner with North Metropolitan Area/Sydney North Region until 2020, when he became a Supporter – this was current until his passing.

He achieved the Scout Wood Badge in 1965 and Leader of Adults Wood Badge in 1991. Peter attended 15 Australian Jamborees, 2 World Jamborees and 1 New Zealand Venture.

He was instrumental in the construction of the brick buildings (hall, kitchen, office) at Bundilla Scout Camp, buildings at Camp Ku-ring-gai and some subcamp facilities at Cataract Scout Park.

For his eminent service to Scouting, Peter was awarded the Silver Kangaroo in 1993 and he was recognised with the Order of Australia medal in 1996.

Peter's life was in Scouts and the community and there will be many stories about his dedication, skills and passion to share the Scouting way of life with others. Rather than a funeral,

Peter wanted an afternoon tea, as a time to remember him.

ALAN OVERTON AWARD

The Alan Overton Award is presented each year to the Adult Member (Leader, Supporter or Fellowship Member) who continues to go above and beyond to deliver Scouting within GWS Region.

The Award is named after Alan Overton AM OAM who is a long-standing member of Scouts NSW and was both the President of Greater Western Sydney Region from June 1994 and the New South Wales Branch Vice President from July 1999 until his retirement in 2016.

Nominations are now being sought for Candidates for the 2022 Alan Overton AM OAM Award. Nominations should be in the form of a one page citation showing how the candidate has provided service to the Region and abide by the following rules:

- 1. This is a Region Award, not connected with the Adult Recognition Awards.
- 2. Leaders, Group Support Committee members and Supporters can be nominated by their peers.
- The person nominated should be over 18 and have held an Adult or Supporter appointment within Scouts NSW.
- It is expected that the person nominated would be someone who has given service to Scouting over and above what would normally be expected.
- 5. Nominations should be with the Region Commissioner by September 1, 2022.

A committee consisting of the Region Commissioner, an Honorary Commissioner and a person invited by the Region Commissioner will assess all nominations.

The Awardee will be announced at the Region Award Presentation in September 2022. The Awardee will have their name recorded on the perpetual trophy and will also receive a replica trophy.

DEPUTY REGION COMMISSIONER AT&D AND DIVERSITY & INCLUSION

So once again this change in Training is about Paperwork. On July 20 this change will go live and effects anyone who starts either their Basic training or their Leadership (Wood Badge) training.

On the Job is now fully online (totally paperless) - so what has become obsolete? The On the Job – Plan, Do and Review which has been replaced by the following...

ON THE JOB – TRAINING

This is started as part of the interview process and has all the questions at the steps which a Trainee must complete and answer the evidence of completion and will prompt when a Trainee should apply for a course.

Once it is completed and submitted online, the Team Leader is notified and has to log in and verify the completion (the Team Leader must have a Wood Badge) or the Trainee has to select another for the Team Leader role, usually one up (DC etc.).

There are two streams in this part of the Training:

- Leader of Youth or
- 2. Program Support Leader

so be aware of what a Trainee is training for, their information and role is very different.

The next change is the following...

ON THE JOB – LEADERSHIP

This can be started as soon as the Trainee becomes a qualified Leader; again the Leaders will need to complete the steps and information required for Wood Badge, then a Trainee will go on their Course and be set the Project. On completion of the form it should be submitted and the Team Leader and the Project Supervisor will be sent notification.


The Team Leader will need to log in and complete the Evaluation of the Leader; the Project Supervisor needs to log in and sign off the completion of the Project. Once these two have been completed the Wood Badge will be awarded and issued. (The Team Leader and the Project Supervisor must hold a Wood Badge) or it will not be accepted by the system).

At this time each year, I take a bit of a break from Outdoor Adventurous Activities and focus on some Indoor Adventurous Activities, namely **Cumberland Gang Show**. It was a great season, and so good to be back after two years with no show, due to COVID.

No doubt you have all probably seen and heard what an absolute awesome effort the cast put into this season. But I want to particularly acknowledge the Back Stage Teams.



There is a lot which happens behind the scenes, which makes Gang Show what it is really known for!

Lighting, Audio, Loft, Stage, Videoing, Cueing, Hand Props and Special Effects.

SCIENCE TEAM REPORT: JAMBORETTE 2022

The June long weekend saw the return of the **GWS** Science Team to Cataract Scout Park for our annual Jamborette. Beautiful clear sky and sunny days looked appealing but cold winds ripped through the campsite Saturday, building to very strong and icy Saturday night. Whilst this was uncomfortable for some, all things "sciencey" were protected in our traditional location in the shed near Pioneer Village. *The Science base featured three different activity areas.*

Buzz regaled enthusiastic Scouts with a nice warm demonstration of traditional Blacksmithing techniques. Aluminium was melted in a crucible (graphite pot) inside furnace to make ingots of aluminium. Buzz has been developing ways of recycling all sorts of materials and these ingots were destined for



re-casting into cosplay costume items. The forge provided yet more heat as he demonstrated how metal rods can be bent and shaped to make useful items by pulverising the hot metal hard with a range of hammers using a small anvil as the base. We all discovered that magnets won't stick to red hot metal!



The activity was rounded off by a demonstration of a chain -mail maker, hydrogen torch and miniature machinery used in cos-play costume manufacture.

Following tradition, Buzz roamed the campsite on Saturday morning modelling

his recent *Cos Play* character *Karxikas Xarmarir*, a Tiefling Ranger which is like a woodman inspired by Dungeons and Dragons. The costume is made from wax hardened leather with exquisite detail and was displayed at the forge activity area.

Scouts also enjoyed using **Microscopes** to examine assorted electronics, bugs and other things very small.

This area also had an activity with a **Tesla Coil** theme. Scouts discovered how electricity can be transmitted wirelessly using resonant coils and electromagnetism. They enjoyed the small purple arc created by a small Tesla coil and then moved to the far end of the shed to be impressed by a larger Tesla coil which produced



eerie purple arcs that danced about in the air whilst making very loud electrical crackling noises and the pronounced odour of ozone. Very spectacular indeed. This activity was rounded off with **Hovercraft** rides for those who dared!

The last activity area was a gas... literally, as the theme was **Carbon Dioxide**. This gas is part of air and gets lots of bad press for its contribution to global warming; however Scouts were able to participate in a range of experiments to investigate its properties.

The area featured CO2 produced by natural fermentation. This was proven through simple experimentation where the gas produced by fermentation was bubbled through a solution of builder's lime in water. When this is exposed to carbon

dioxide the solution turns milky. They also discovered that CO2 is produced by making a solution of citric acid power and bicarbonate of soda with a little water. Bubbling the gas through the lime also turned



the liquid cloudy, demonstrating the presence of the gas. Blowing bubbles through the liquid also turned it cloudy.

With some care we experimented with **dry ice**. This CO2 is solid at temperatures of around minus 80 degrees and at normal air pressure the ice doesn't melt. The carbon dioxide sublimes as it goes straight from solid form to gas. We had an experiment where some dry ice chips were put into a small plastic pipette bulb and clamped closed. With the plastic bulb immersed in water to slowly heat the dry ice, we were able to see a few drops of liquid carbon dioxide for an instant before the plastic bulb explodes. It is a good demonstration of how the gas version of CO2 takes up much more volume than its frozen form. This was further reinforced by using a dry ice pellet to blow the lid off a tin with the increasing pressure as the ice sublimed to gas.

Pouring the heavier than air CO2 down a staircase of candles showed how this gas can put out flames and dry ice pellets provided the temperature difference to run a Stirling Engine.

The final section of this activity had Scouts making a **chemical compound** from strange powders. The completed edible concoction produced CO2 when mixed with Scout saliva along with flavourful tingling in everyone's mouth!
